It was wonderful to read so many merit certificates at last week's assembly with students being acknowledged for their use of one or more of the Keys. It was also fantastic to read that so many students were acknowledged for their improved or excellent writing this term.

Semester 1 (Terms 1 & 2) is when the first formal reporting to parents occurs. Reporting is the process of communicating the outcomes of assessments and learning opportunities to parents, carers and students. Teachers assess the learning and development of their students across the two terms and their report writing is well under way. Assessments are an integral part of teaching and learning; educative; fair; designed to meet a specific purpose; lead to informative reporting and also lead the process of school-wide evaluation processes. Assessments combined with positive learning environments and inclusive learning opportunities that teachers provide enables all students to be developing and learning at their individual rate and achieving personal milestones at all levels across the school.

Student reports will be sent home in week 10 in a sealed envelope addressed to the parent/carer and students <u>will not</u> be permitted to open them at school. Reports are a legal document and Reporting to Parents is required under the Education Act. A lot of time and effort goes into producing them so I encourage you to take the time to sit with your child/ren and go through their report with them. It is important to look at the whole report and not just the grade; comments and the effort given by teachers are just as valuable.



Learning and acknowledging National Reconciliation Week (27 May – 3 June) was evident in classrooms across the school; Reconciliation Week is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey – the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision respectively. 

NATIONAL SIMULTANEOUS STORY TIME

On Wednesday 25th May, we participated in the National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS), held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. Now in its 22nd successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Kindy to Year 6.

We met in the library and Miss Beeson read to the whole school at the same time that millions of others were doing the same thing across Australia. This year the book we read was <u>Family Tree</u>, written by Josh Pyke and illustrated by Ronojoy Ghosh; it is a lovely story narrated by a seed that grows. We see the gum tree twig taking root in a glass jar: as a house is built, and foundations are being laid, roots are growing...

WHOLE SCHOOL PROGRAM:



On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings each week, all students in Pre-primary to Year 6 are required to participate in Jump Jam as a key component of our Whole School Daily Fitness Program, with many of our Kindy students enthusiastically joining in too.

Jump Jam is specifically designed for school aged students (and teachers) to challenge fundamental movements skills, increase fitness, develop student leadership and motivate students to move & enjoy exercise. It also allows for development of a wide range of movement skills that can help students to understand the 'science' of how they move, providing a valuable exercise habit early in life along with skills and attitudes to meet their ongoing health and physical activity needs.

Cardiovascular fitness is interwoven with dance, drama and music to allow students to explore and identify a variety of dance styles; through a fusion of dance & fitness disciplines along with cultural interpretations, cultural movement concepts from a variety of societies are included; e.g. Haka, Polynesian, Latin, Indian, South African, Spanish and even martial arts fitness.

As well as meeting curriculum requirements, Jump Jam links closely with our Social and Emotional Health Priority: The health and well-being of our staff and students is paramount to the success and effective operation of our school; it is at the forefront of everything we do.
